What is Brighter Futures?

Since as early as 2003, clusters of volunteer residents, community workers and small groups have worked together with stakeholders in Rhyl to develop various initiatives designed to address local needs around poverty and social inclusion. These initiatives have been individually nurtured to mature into various self-governing organisations that provide support and services to children, young people, families, the elderly, those with disabilities, socially isolated and experiencing multiple forms of poverty.

Although each of these organisations have developed independently, a close and unique plethora of strong relations have been upheld which have seeded and fostered close partnership working and community cohesion.

Building on these relationships and in an effort to be a new model of best practice within community organisations, The consortium is pioneering the establishment of a registered charity sharing of resources, skills, facilities and assets called Brighter Futures which was established in early in 2018.

Brighter Futures is a formal association of self-governing groups cooperating under written agreement to enable each groups to work collaboratively while delivering independently, measuring outcomes and impact based of separate aims and allocating resources in a way that reduces costs, increases chances for sustainability and broadens the effectiveness of the groups for a better future.

In simple terms "brighter futures" is several groups, in one community, working together and sharing assets to reduce costs and make a greater impact on the lives of families and people across multiple generations.

What will Brighter Futures do?



Brighter Futures will set out to initially achieve the following priorities:

- 1. Formation of Brighter Futures as an unincorporated association
- 2. Mapping exercise (individual group needs, consortia needs and wider community needs)
- 3. SWOT analysis of the consortium members
- 4. Creation of a formal consortium agreement
- 5. Creation of a new shared home for groups
- 6. Redevelopment of the unincorporated association into a registered charity

An Individual from each of the members groups will pool their skills and resources to achieve the initial development and formation of the consortium prior to secondary/continuation aims being considered.







The creation of a formal consortium open to voluntary, community, youth organisations in Rhyl that enables and encourages close partnerships working, reduced duplication and improved financial sustainability.

Proposed Strategic Aims:

A). Purchase or long lease and manage a shared community asset and land

- B). Generate a none restricted income stream from assets & services
- C). Reduce each originations core running costs by up to 20% within 12 months

D). Develop and commence organisational development plans based on one shared consortia framework.

E). Cross train and multi skill employees from each group improving overall performance by sharing human resources

F). Develop a new shared volunteering system that spans all consortia members

G). Review policies and procedures of member groups to complement and reflect each other's standards.



Proposed Objectives to deliver aims:

Specific aims for year 1: (A)

i). We will identify a property that meets the established needs of all consortia members to include, indoor changeable spaces for various activities, outdoor space for games, sports and relaxation, unit for workshop activities.

ii). We will fully cost for purchase, adaptation, upgrade and annual running costs, research and identify various potential capital grant and loan options.

iii). We will secure all legal necessities

Specific aims for year 1: (B)

i). We will identify and examine appropriate and minimal risk income generation options and apply these to a 3 year cash flow forecast,

ii). We will establish a reserves fund within 12 months that affords the consortium's planned 12 month facility running costs space.

iii). We will establish tenancy agreements with consortia partners and external groups wishing to use the facilities.

Specific aims for year 1: (C)

i). We will map out individual member groups annual running costs.

ii). We will identify areas for cost reduction through resources management.

iii). We will monitor costs over a 12 month period and compare these to previously established expenditure.

Specific aims for year 1: (D)

i). Review all policies, highlighting differences and similarities.



ii). Develop a bank of "template policies that can be implemented by individual groups"

iii). Develop a policy and guidance document for resolving conflicts internally

Specific aims for year 1: (E)

i). Review of all skills requirements and current skills of employees

- ii). Consult with all employees and support inclusion in skills analysis
- iii). Creation of a new competency framework for all employee roles
- iv). Creation of an up-skilling and retraining plan for all employees
- v). Review all support and supervision procedures and streamline

Specific aims for year 1: (F)

- i). Review all established volunteer policies and procedures
- ii). Create a single policy for the consortia
- iii). Research IIV and other quality assurance systems
- iv). Develop a volunteer's fund and reward system

Specific aims for year 1: (G)

- i). Review core policies and highlight conflicts
- ii). Create a proposal for policy changes that can resolve any conflicting items
- iii). Support each member group to implement any required changes

Identified Need:



Our groups have worked to identify local need based on our current services being used.

1. Community Facilities:

West Rhyl currently has a number of Community Facilities, these are the Foryd Centre, Wellington Community Centre, West Rhyl Young Peoples Project, St Mary's Presbytery and the ASK centre. Our consortium has studied each, its usage and potential ability to house our groups and activities.

Foryd Centre, We would not be able to run our projects due to the level of current activity (we have been renting premises from the Foryd for the past 6 months, however these are far too small and expensive for our needs. Wellington Community Centre, This facility is closing and moving to SW Rhyl. West Rhyl Young Peoples Project: We would not be able to run our projects due to the level of current activity at the centre.

St. Mary's Presbytery: This facility is closing and the building being sold. **ASK centre:** We would not be able to run our projects due to the level of current activity at the centre. We have used the facility recently for small events.

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Member organisation Profiles:

Rhyl Men's Shed

Rhyl Men's Shed is a community organisation run by it's members, for its members. Our overall aim is to reduce both the causes and effects of isolation and loneliness, poverty and social exclusion affecting people in our community.

Our secondary aim is to build strong, trusting and lasting relationships and to run inclusive, educative and fun community events. We deliver participative, engaging projects that benefit those involved while enhancing the community, we always seek to gather views, undertake research and promote involvement in decision making to ensure a dynamic and flexible organisation able to adapt to local needs and the needs of members and the wider community. Our Shed was the first Established in North Wales and has been running and growing since September 2013. We have also recently piloted our Woman's Shed following a number of requests from community members, residents, partners and other organizations working in the area.

Rhyl Youth Group

Our group has been established thanks to local young people and adults working together over the past few years building confidence of young people, intergenerational trust and creating the space for young people to become involved in delivering services for themselves, we have a committee with 5 young people, 4 junior members and advisory members from the Police, youth workers, community workers, residents and organisations such as Street Games UK, Sported and Empower be the change who are helping us grow and develop. We have been running in West Rhyl for a number of years and recently become a constituted group. We are members of the CWVYS and a registered doorstep sports club. We run our own Youth Café in the evenings which has lots of stuff to keep our peers out of trouble and off the streets, we also go on trips and activities regularly. We also cook our own food for each other each evening and run a tuck-shop.

Street Games

Our street games group is supported by / part of the UK wide Street Games movement and a registered doorstep sports club, we run sessions every week for young people to "get physical" and try out various games and activities, as well as mainstream sports we play games based on young peoples interests (such as computer games like Fortnite, and encourage members to play computer games in the real world, we also run fit & fed programmes (the only group in Denbighshire) and work with Denbighshire Council to train local young people as sports leaders / couches to support sessions along with adult volunteers.



Rhyl Parent & Toddler Group

Our Parent and toddler group provides for children from birth to 5 years. An informal and friendly environment for parents and carers to bring children to play and interact with others to build confidence and social skills. Songs, stories, small world, messy play, role play area, baby area with activity mats and floor toys. Snack time consists of a variation of cereal, toast, various fruit, biscuits and milk whilst also encouraging them to sit at the table with others. Parents/carers share and give advice to each other of their experiences during the children's first few years such as potty training, temper tantrums, feeding, money issues, housing and general parenting, the groups aims to provide a space where people feel a part of our community and a place to build relationships.

Rhyl Women's Shed

Rhyl Women's Shed is an informal Ladies Group that any female of any age can attend. We provide a comfortable safe place where women from all walks of life can all meet up and do as much or as little as they want. Some may take part in various structured activities such as crafts, Mosaic making and training courses and others just drop in for a cuppa and a friendly chat, reducing isolation and loneliness. The women involved also have the chance to raise money for charitable causes, participate in trips away and get involved in community benefit projects.

Wi Fi Connections

We are a group of experienced community development workers, youth workers and IT specialists working across North Wales and the North West. At WiFi connections we provide Free and very low cost IT solutions to community groups, Charities and individuals seeking compliant, secure and environmentally conscious activities. WE have also led on the Digital Rhyl project providing free WiFi at community facilities and Cloud 9 training young people in primary schools to be safe online.

Moontime

Sadly in our current climate many people are forced to turn Food Banks as a way of life and recent research has shown that many women and young girls are struggling to afford female hygiene products that are an absolute necessity.

After recognising this we set up The Moon Time Project.

The projects aim is to make that time of the month less of a burden for those Women. We have set times where discreet Moon Packs can be collected free of charge for anyone that need them. Each pack contains Sanitary products, Deodorant, Shower gel, Tooth Brush and Toothpaste and Shampoo and Conditioner. We currently distribute to schools, community facilities and anyone coming in from the streets.



A new community Facility

We have identified 34 Wellington Road as a potentially suitable facility to house the groups and projects, while also providing potential for expansion and use by other organisations.

A change of use planning application has been submitted to Denbighshire County Council following local consultation to acquire D1 permission, outline discussion with building controllers has identified that CDM will be required for phase 2 works, phase 1 works may require CDM should they span 1 month or if drainage works are found to be necessary. In this event Compagna Ltd will be engaged further.

Various options have been discussed with members, volunteer and staff from all groups, feedback from Partnership groups has been positive and supportive. Informal outline discussions with elected members have been undertaken

A 10 year lease has been agreed with the landlord, an option to purchase in the future is being negotiated (to be discussed with funders).

Redevelopment works are being costed for an initial refit and a future refit, fundraising locally is taking place alongside seeking grant funds, additionally various offers of in-kind support have come in from local trades people and suppliers such as Dulux and Wilko's amongst others.

An initial outline plan based on consultation results has been drawn up, while Parry Davies architects produce scale drawings :

- 4. Your members are DBS checked where appropriate.
- 5. Your organisation is established to benefit the people of Rhyl. (Or agree to use Consortia provided model policies and systems to comply with the above).
